[The following section is taken from a report prepared for the "Qualified Voters of Celoron" in regards to the building of a new high school and grade school.]

1929 - Present School Facilities

It is generally conceded that the school facilities in Celoron are entirely inadequate. The State authorities have patiently insisted upon their improvement for over five years. If every voter were to visit all the buildings and makeshifts now used and then visit a new modern school they would be readily convinced of this need. The following facts in regard to the present building are of interest to all.

1. SIX separate buildings are now being used for school purposes:

- (a) The present high school.
- (b) The present Glidden Avenue school.
- (c) Four portable buildings on the high school grounds.

2. THE PRESENT HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING was erected over twenty-five years ago. The building contains only eight classrooms, several minor rooms, an assembly room in the cellar, and toilets and furnaces in the cellar.

The interior of the building is non-fireproof. The heating, lighting and toilet facilities do not come anywhere near conforming with the present State's Standards. Rather than build a modern addition to such a building as this the Board feels it much wiser to build an entirely new building by itself, thoroughly fireproof and conforming with all the State requirements and standards, and connecting this new building with a corridor connection with the present building, so that the pupils in the present building may go to and fro, and have free use of the proposed gymnasium and other rooms in the new building, and that the teachers may go back and forth. The State

Department of Education has very definitely advised against attempting to add to this building.

3. It is intended to discontinue the use of the portables, and continue the use of the present building for grades only.

NOTE: The new brick school was built. It, too, became history with a vote for modernization in August 1954.
