# New Dowcraft Officer Elected At Falconer

A Lakewood man Saturday was elected secretary and treasurer of Dowcraft Corp. of Falconer.

Marshall A. Larson, controller of the Dow St. firm since October, 1955, was named by the board of directors to the new post following the annual shareholders' meeting held in the Village Plaza Motel.

Mr. Larson also was re-elected to the board of directors during the shareholders' meeting.

Other officers elected included Alfred G. Ford, chairman of the board; G. Elving Lundine, president; M. Richard Jankoski, vice president, production; and M. Roy Gustafson, vice president, sales.

Mr. Larson, a 1930 graduate of Jamestown High School, received his bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Alabama in 1935.

During WW II, he was a captain in the Adjutant General's Office.

Prior to joining Dowcraft last October, Mr. Larson was associated with Marlin Rockwell's sales department and was manager of distribution for the appliance division of Blackstone Corp.

Mr. Larson and his wife, Dorothy, live at 106 Winchester Road, W.E. They are the parents of a son, James, now attending Eastern Kentucky State University, and a daughter, Marsha, a student at the University of Kentucky.

A report to stockholders was issued by Dowcraft president G. Elving Lundine at Saturday's meeting which described the firm's fifth year of operations as unfolding "new highs and achievements."

"Sales soared to a record one and two-thirds million," Mr. Lundine reported, adding, "Shipments for the first time went over the million dollar figure."

He said several large partitions contracts have been negotiated, indicating that "Dowcraft is moving into a position among the leaders of this industry."

Mr. Lundine said the firm entered its sixth year "with a record backlog of well over the million dollar figure."

The surge in sales, he noted

has kept pressure on the production department.

Pointing out that a new addition has been built at the Dow S. plant, he said further expansion possibilities are under consideration by the board of directors.
