

**Kling Factories, Inc. and Trans Metals, Inc.**, which began operation in May in the former Borden milk plant building. Both are located in industrial zone near the railroad between Main Street and Maple Street.

Robert McLaughlin of Maple Street, primarily concerned with Kling's furniture factory, showed color slides taken last week as evidence of what he described as particle-laden smoke from that plant, and closeups of siding at his home which he says is being damaged by what he believes to be unburned sawdust. He said the problem is worse now than it has ever been.

Mr. McLaughlin also had taken pictures in the area of Trans-Metals' plant following an eruption of smoke which Main Street neighbors say occurs periodically throughout the day. The slides showed buildings hazed out as by fog.

A representative of Trans-Metals was present and assured the board and those present that the company was attempting to correct the situation. He said a representative of American Air Filters Co. of Buffalo contacted three weeks ago arrived just yesterday, and that quotations on filtering equipment are being obtained. He also stated that a larger smoke stack and a duct system have been purchased and will be installed as soon as possible. He said the contractor is being contacted almost daily. He described the smoke as chloride and non-toxic.

Kling officials also were notified of expected complaints at last night's meeting and invited to be present but did not attend. Mr. McLaughlin asked that the zoning officer, Max Duink, issue a notice of violation and that the town board support the zoning officer in the matter. Mr. Duink agreed to serve the notice and board members assured their backing.

Eric Olofson, chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, and Gunnard Sandberg, a member of the Planning Board, voiced their respective board's opinion that action should be taken. Both boards had viewed the slides earlier in the week.

During the meeting, the board adopted a tentative budget of \$82,545.88 for 1967, up \$747.32 from this year's \$81,798.53. Increased assessments of over \$70,000 will more than offset this raise in town budget but a higher tax rate is expected due to increased county costs.

A public hearing on the proposed budget was set for 7:30 p.m. Nov. 3, preceding the regular board meeting.

board could take no action since the Zoning Ordinance states the decision of the Zoning Board of Appeals shall be final.

The Zoning Board granted a special use permit to Oberg Brothers to allow for the multiple dwelling following a public hearing on the matter at which only three persons voiced objections and several spoke in favor of the project. About 40 persons attended the hearing.

The Town Board voted that signers of the petition be notified that appeal of the decision must be made in County Court.

Robert S. Payne, town officer, requested the board consider an ordinance prohibiting parking on the east side of Pearl Street near the Main Street intersection. He said cars parked on both sides of the street narrow it to one lane and create a traffic hazard as well as hampering snow removal and preventing passage of fire trucks.

Officer Payne was authorized to consult with the town attorney and have an ordinance drawn up.

Purchase of snow tires for the police car also was authorized. The resignation of William A. Tornstrom as town constable was accepted. Mr. Tornstrom has joined the Sheriff's Department staff. Mrs. Howard Eckman was approved as a school crossing guard to replace Mrs. Carol Stanton.

Peace Justice Willard Cass Jr. reported a request for a cleanup day in fall, such as is provided each spring, and the board agreed. Saturday, Oct. 22, was set as date for town trucks to make collections.

The board unanimously passed a formal resolution adopting a new trailer ordinance and the town clerk, Herman Seehausen, was instructed to post and publish the ordinance, which will go into effect 10 days after publication.

A resolution also was passed extending the water district to include the Jamestown Rendering Co. property. George Guild, water district superintendent, received authorization to purchase 12 water meters.

The board approved an agreement with the county for snow removal on Oak Hill Road at actual cost. Steve Kocur, highway superintendent, reported graveling at the sanitary landfill had been completed and that the operation had been moved to a more easily accessible section for the winter months. He was authorized to advertise for bids for two new trucks for the highway department. The board also voted to include blacktopping of Carlberg Road in the 1967 budget.
