

Summer Reading 2021

Tails and Tales

The library was thrilled to return to in-person, outdoor programming as part of our Summer Reading Challenge. The challenge ran from June through August, with 795 participants and 1742 free books given away, thanks to a grant from Cummins.

In 2021 we explored the "tails" and "tales" of our community. We partnered with the Chautauqua County Humane Society, and with help from the Audubon & Roger Tory Peterson Institute, discovered the many different "tails" that live along the Jamestown Riverwalk. We also explored the historic makers around the city to learn more about the tales of our local history.

The Jamestown Public School's LEAP Camps returned in 2021. The library partnered with the YMCA, the YWCA and the Jamestown Boys and Girls Club to make sure the LEAP campers were part of the library's Summer Reading Program.

Library staff visited LEAP camps during the summer, bringing our Mobile Makerspace so campers could explore STEAM concepts through play.

We also worked with the YMCA to offer grab-&-go lunches area families. The free meal program began two years ago and continues to grow.







Collaborative and Creative

Collaborating with our Community

The library strives to reach our community both inside our walls and outside the library, to make sure we are connecting with Jamestown residents.

In 2021, our staff worked with the Jamestown Public Market, running a stall at the Market to promote the library's resources. We also visited the Audubon Community Nature Center's Snowflake Festival and Monarch Festival with library information and activities. In December, we collaborated with the Chautauqua County Humane Society to offer a drive-through pet food giveaway in the library's parking lot. Over 200 people received free pet food at the event!

We also worked extensively with local children at the YMCA, Boys and Girls Club, and Jamestown Public Schools' LEAP camps. Staff brought our mobile Makerspace with a variety of STEAM-focused activities, including marble runs, magnetiles, robotics, and crafting.



A New Focus on Crafting

This year, we developed a new focus on crafting for children and adults, offering demonstrations and hands-on learning of skills like spinning, dyeing, and weaving. Crafting activities for children were offered after storytimes all summer and throughout the Mobile Market visits each Wednesday morning. We also developed a new program called "Crafting & Community," which invites adults to socialize and work on crafts every Thursday evening.

Every other week attendees participated in a planned craft such as decorating bee houses, making windchimes, and dyeing scarves.

Community Partner Spotlight







In 2021, the library operated with a team of 18 people. The staff is cross-trained to quickly move from helping a patron in the Children's Room to assisting with a question at the Reference Desk.
