LETTER TO OUR COMMUNITY

In 2022, the James Prendergast Library demonstrated that it was ready to reconnect, as shown by robust activity at the library. Our Summer Reading Program statistics were back to high levels of engagement with over 800 youth, teen, and adult participants!

What makes JPLA so special is the initiative and creativity that the team brings to the library every day. Below are a few examples of new and innovative services and projects that staff put into place in 2022:

- Created a new initiative that brings community nonprofits to the library to host educational classes and programs.
- Updated the teen space with new games, furniture, and art projects.
- Created new teen programs including Teen Crafting.
- Went on 39 outreach visits to spread the word about library programs and services.
- Created new adult computer classes with topics on how to use Excel, Online privacy protection, and smartphone photography.
- Improved the collection's "browsability" by making children and adult material easier to find.

With lots of positive energy to fuel us, I look forward to 2023. Over the next year, we will work on a new strategic plan; incorporating ambitious sustainability goals to enhance what the library offers the community. What an exciting time for the James Prendergast Library and the Jamestown community. 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FIRST ANNUAL COMMUNITY BLOCK PARTY



On May 21, 2022, we hosted our First Annual Community Block Party which featured over 30 local organizations. Over 500 people attended participating in lawn games, storytimes, a plant swap, a scavenger hunt, and connecting with local organizations and community members.

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Strategic Plan Progress Report Highlights

Developed a new program initiative - The Murray L. Bob Education Initiative.

Created a new partnership with JHS English teacher Betsy Rowe-Baehr to bring her English 9 and 10 student to the library monthly for programs and library usage.

Added topic bins for more picture books in the Children's Room.

Expanded the manga/anime collections due to patron requests.

Expanded the nontraditional collection to include bike locks and charging cords based on in-library needs.

Reinstated several adult computer classes such as Working with Excel and Introduction to Microsoft Word.

Awarded a NYS Library Construction Grant for a new outdoor patio and walkway in front of the library, and HVAC upgrades.

Received a grant to update collection storage, including magazines, children's books, and microfilm. Purchased two new Children's Education Stations with LearningBoard keyboards and mice.

Improved the employee onboarding process to increase efficiency and staff morale.

Crated a new sponsorship packet that list events and programs that businesses can sponsor – packet was sent out in early 2022 with a return of over \$3000!

Hosted the first Library Community Block Party to celebrate partnerships and raise awareness about nonprofits' collaborative work in Jamestown and the surrounding area.

Worked with WJTN to present a weekly radio program to promote library programs during the 2022 Summer Reading Program.

Created a new library facility plan, approved by the Board of Trustees and updated yearly.

Created recurring social posts highlighting the library collection and digital resources.

Coming in 2023

Outdoor Patio

A new outdoor program and event space is coming – anticipated installation early June 2023.

Music Classes

Children's Music Project will host weekly music classes for toddlers and caregivers during Summer Reading 2023.

Student Liasions

We anticipate adding one or two Jamestown High School students to the library's Board of Trustees in 2023.

Books & Brews

Starting in February 2023, the library hosts a monthly adult bookclub a the local hangout Brazil's Beer and Wine Lounge

Energy Updates

Grant funds will update and improve energy efficiency in the library building, paving the way for future sustainability initiatives.

Summer Reading 2022 Oceans of Possibilities 808 Participants - 912,866 Minutes Read



Our summer reading program was a great success this year, with many families enjoying our expanded programming, new outdoor sensory play activities, and our summer reading challenge. We also expanded our prize program to include "Read for Beads." For every hour read or one activity completed, children received a bead to add to their necklace. This program had a great response, and we are excited to continue the program in 2023. Some children earned over 60 beads throughout the summer! One parent said, **"The bead program really made my daughter want to read."**



Murray L. Bob Education Initiative

The Bob Education Initiative brings community organizations to the library to conduct classes and run programs. This initiative honors former director of the Prendergast Library and the Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System, Murray L. Bob.







Audubon Community Nature Center

The Audubon offered two programs for families at the library: a Nature Discovery Station and a Community Science Day. Kids and families learned about animal tracks, engaged with local animal and plantlife, and even released some butterflies!

Audubon also held three lectures on Monarch butterflies, their preferred plants, and raising Monarch caterpillars.

Infinity Visual and Performing Arts

Over the summer, Infinity offered four all-ages drumming workshops at the library, and four with the library at Jamestown parks. Kids and adults alike had a wonderful time learning rhythms and getting loud!

This program was supported in part by the Chautauqua Region Community Foundation.

Pearl City Clay House

Pearl City Clay House, a program of Infinity, offered several workshops including bookbinding, zine making, blackout meditations, and creating a recycled desk organizer.

Attendees at these programs were able to get creative, try something new, and take home their finished products!

New Teen Programs

2022 included several new programs for teens at the library!

We started a weekly Teen Crafting program in April of 2022, hosting 246 attendees for crafts including zine making, resin, wet felting, and Kool-Aid dyeing.

Teens kicked off Summer Reading with a tie-dye and pizza party on the library's front lawn. Throughout the summer, we offered programs including an escape room, bookmark contest, book clubs, and trivia for teens.

New Materials



Braille Books

In 2022, we expanded our collection of available Braille books to the public, adding more well-known titles, including The Mouse and the Motorcycle, Bridge to Terabithia, and My Side of the Mountain.

Highlights Hello

Did you know that even babies can enjoy magazines? So in 2022, we added "Highlights Hello" to our collection of magazine subscriptions. With durable pages, lots of photos, and engaging rhymes and poems, these magazines are designed with our youngest readers in mind.



Spanish Books

Our Spanish collection grew this year with more titles by Spanish authors and translations of popular bestsellers in English. In the Children's Room, we also reorganized our World Languages section so the collection is more visible and accessible to the public. This collection includes a wide variety of languages, including Spanish, French, German, and Japanese,
